About the Summer School

This program is an exciting opportunity for undergraduate students to learn about Europe's migration and integration challenges. Taught over six days by academic faculty from The Australian National University and Indiana University, the Berlin Summer School will also draw on academic expertise from German universities and cultural institutions.

This intensive Summer School will bring undergraduates to Berlin to learn about European immigration and integration challenges. Study topics include: Islam in Europe; multiculturalism; relationship between culture and citizenship; memorialisation versus community-based memory-making; refugee documentary; political change.

The academic focus is enhanced by opportunities to engage with the first-hand experiences of European migrants, curators of cultural institutions, NGOs, and government officials.

As well as providing you with a fantastic unique experience during the Program, we want to ensure you remain safe and well. In this guide we have provided you with some food for thought as you embark on this journey, because we believe that it is an important part of risk management for you to consider any potential issues that might occur while you are away from home, no matter how unlikely, and to plan how you might deal with an incident if it occurs. Meals

Only some meals are covered by the Summer School. You will have breakfast from Monday to Saturday at Hotel Johann covered, and we will invite you to some lunches throughout the week and to a welcome dinner on Monday. Where possible dietary requirements will be supported but those with allergies need to take special care of their needs.



School program and readings

You will find a draft of the Berlin Summer School program at the end of this guide and will be provided with any updates as they occur. You will also receive a reading pack; please read it before the commencement of the Summer School.

Conduct

As a Berlin Summer School participant, you are expected to exhibit the highest standards of professional behaviour, including treating everyone with courtesy and respect, engaging in conduct that is respectful of differences and not discriminatory, and refraining from behaviour that may harm the reputation of your institution. You are also expected to take responsibility for your own learning and wellbeing, and notify the teaching team if you notice any threat or danger to the safety of yourself or others.

Travel to Berlin

- → Ensure you obtain formal approval to travel from your home institution and that you are covered by a travel insurance policy for the whole duration of your travel
- → Carefully review all travel documents, policies and procedures, including the personal accident policy, provided by your home institution so you are aware of your obligations and entitlements (incl. travel policy, travel information kit)
- → Consult with your home institution's Health Service as early as possible for any travel medicine or immunisation requirements
- → Check current travel advice and register your trip with appropriate government agency:

 Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade for Australians, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and

 Trade for New Zealanders, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for Singapore citizens
- → Check with the German Embassy in your home country on visa requirements
- → Make sure your passport is valid for sufficient time from planned date of return (usually 6 mths)
- → Make sure you pack comfortable footwear and smart casual clothes

About Berlin

- → Located in the eastern part of Germany, Berlin has a humid continental climate and can get very hot in summertime.
- → German is the national language, but the Summer School and the tours will be conducted entirely in English.
- → Germany's currency is EURO.
- → Please contact your mobile telephone and internet provider to activate international roaming to ensure you don't get caught by bill shock.
- → Look into the type of power adapter you will need to purchase to use any electricals you take from home.

DIRECTIONS

Public transportation is very well developed in Berlin. You can check connections and schedules here: http://www.bvg.de/en/. The service is also available as an app "BVG FahrInfo Plus" which works on Android and Apple devices. One single ticket costs 2.80€ (from Berlin Schönefeld Airport 3.40€). Taxis are generally more expensive in Germany than in the U.S. Here are some phone numbers if you want to order a taxi: +49-30-20 20 20 (Taxi Berlin), +49-30-20 20 21 220 (TaxiFunk Berlin), +49-30-26 30 00 (Quality Taxi). You can also flag down a free cab on the street or go to a taxi stand.

By public transportation (50min)

then take bus M41 (in direction "Sonnenallee/ Baumschulenstraße") to "Blücherstraße" (7 stops), Take bus TXL (in direction "S+U Alexanderplatz") to "S+U Berlin Hauptbahnhof" (5 stops).

walk 6min, altogether 53min

then take the subway U6 (in direction "Alt-Mariendorf") to "Hallesches Tor" (14 stops), Take bus 128 (in direction "Osloer Straße") to "U Kurt-Schumacher-Platz" (6 stops), walk 11min, altogether 44min

By taxi (30-35min, ca. 35€)



Things to consider in the event of an emergency
